**Summer Lunch Invitation**



## Trustees Report for the year to January 2005

“Yes, we all take our voice for granted, with it we can talk, laugh, sing or even cry out for help, without giving a second thought to what is going on in our throats.”

Those were the words that were spoken by Martin Jarvis on BBC Radio 4 on the 9th May 2004 when he made the appeal on behalf of the Charity. It marked another step forward in the development of the Charity during what has been an exceptionally exciting year. We were very honoured when Martin Jarvis agreed to become a Patron. When looking over the past year in order to write this report it was a question of what would have to be left out as there was so much material rather than what I could find to put in!

The focus this year has been on improving our own forms of communication within the Charity in a number of different ways. One of these is by attending seminars held for professionals. Here it is possible to provide information about the Charity and its work and meet the professionals who carry out the vital medical and rehabilitative work that is so important. The Rotherham Seminar was featured in the April Newsletter.

Improving the Newsletter is another example of our improved communication. It has undergone a transformation and now comes in a smart glossy format – a long way from the early days when I remember my parents working hard to put together the various items at our much used kitchen table!

As a result of the money raised through the appeal and also through other generous donations we have been able to increase the provision of grants to neck breathers where there has been a real need for assistance. We are proud of what we have achieved over the past twenty years and look forward with confidence to the future.

The Trustees remain committed to continuing the work of the Charity so that laryngectomees and their families are supported through what can be a difficult and distressing time.

As a child Bernard lived in Lancashire and started work just before WW2 commenced when he volunteered for the RAF and became a gunner in Halifax. He spent the last few months of the war in the Far East where he contracted malaria and enjoyed convalescing in Macao. On return to the UK he commenced work with the Rank Organisation and spent the whole of his working life in the leisure industry also serving the Truste House Forte group. During this time he arranged events and met many stars. His work at Belle Vue Zoo led to many interesting encounters with animals who seemed to prefer human company to staying in their enclosures.

Another of Bernard's colourful interests is his pleasure in water-colour painting. He spends holidays in France with his son and returns with his own creations to remember the scene. Although never a cigarette smoker he did smoke a pipe but thinks his throat cancer was probably due to spending many hours at work in smokey environments.

Becoming a laryngectomee has not prevented Bernard from being a very active fund-raiser
